

PASTOR'S SEARCH UPDATE

A Minute for Pastor Search



Session has been meeting every week, reading Pastor's Information Forms (PIF's), and praying. With upcoming travels, there will be a couple of weeks that we don't meet.

Due to the nature of the computer matching process in Louisville, the PIF's we have gotten so far have not been good matches. "Examples in some of the PIF's: Wants an urban church in a poverty neighborhood; will reinterpret Scripture; bi-lingual in Eng.-Arabic; bi-lingual in Eng.-Korean; a clergy couple of 2 women; a 'new way of

doing church'; will address the gender of God controversy and refers to the H.S. as 'she'. The Session is hoping for a mutually beneficial relationship with a pastor, and these applicants skill-sets would not be put to good use in Berthoud, and our needs would not be met.

I re-read your comments on the survey now and then to refresh my mind on what your hopes for the church are. And as we read over a PIF, we consider you as individuals, and think how would this candidate affect so and so. A couple of PIF's from 2 pastors in Kansas and Nebraska looked promising, but after contacting them, we found out that they did not know that their applications had been sent to our church, and they were not interested in relocating. We just changed the previous experience requirement, and that resulted in several more PIF's.

Since we are not completely satisfied with the PCUSA computer matching process in Louisville, we did ask Jen Rotar, the webmaster for our church website, to come to our last meeting and she gave us suggestions for other online pastor search sites. We will look into that. Gary Letourneau from Mt. View Pres. is looking around for anyone he might know that would be interested.

We are trusting God that when the time is right, a pastor will be provided. Nevertheless, this process does remind me of a conversation I had with my mom years ago. A staunch Presbyterian in Gordon, NE, my hometown, she would never have thought of leaving the church. I asked her, "What do you do when you have a pastor you don't like?" She said, "Oh, we just turn our hearing aids down."

We continue to look for someone who will, like the Scripture says about David, "shepherd his people with integrity." But remember, we still have THE Good Shepherd, who restores our souls every day, and leads us in the paths of righteousness for His name's sake. For this we thank God.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR IHN WEEK—July 19-26

Our next week to co-host Interfaith Hospitality Network (IHN) will be July 19-26. IHN is an organization made up of churches in Loveland and Berthoud. The purpose is to support homeless families with children in our area. The goal is to help these families become self-sufficient. A very high percentage of the families who participate DO become self-sufficient. We hear so much about poverty and homelessness and often feel very helpless in the face of such problems. IHN is a way you can contribute to helping with these issues in a very real way.

IHN operates almost entirely through the efforts of volunteers. Our church has participated with IHN for about 15 years and we always need new Volunteers. Some examples of ways you can help are: Prepare a meal (usually 2-3 people contribute to a meal) Evening Hosts: The Evening Hosts arrive at the church at 5:00pm. They greet families, help set tables for meal, participate with families as needed. It is very easy to take cues from families on how much interaction they would like. Over Night Hosts: A representative of the church is required to be present at all times. The overnight hosts arrive at 8:00pm and leave at 7:00am the next morning. A private and comfortable sleeping room is provided. Laundry Host: The Laundry Host picks up linens at the end of our week, launders and returns to church. There is usually one load of laundry.

There is a sign up board in the back of the Sanctuary which gives full details about the schedule and the various Volunteer opportunities. We do need **VOLUNTEERS** so please looks at the board if you might be able to help.

THE IMPORTANCE OF PRAYER

Amid the beautiful rolling terrain just outside Bardstown, Kentucky sits the Abbey of Gethsemane in which resides a community of Trappist monks. All who enter the Trappist Monastic Order take vows of poverty,

work, and silence in order to discipline themselves for a life of prayer.

On my first visit to Gethsemane, I took with me a suspicion that these hooded figures were running from the world. After a day in this community of prayer, I quickly changed my mind.

Selected monks are allowed to break their vow of silence in order to speak with visitors to the monastery. Conversing with our host for the day, the question was asked, "How do you justify living so completely apart from the world?" No defensiveness marked the monk's answer, only firm resolve. After acknowledging that God calls

people to many difference tasks, the man said, "Our ministry is prayer. We pray for the world. We pray for the success of the gospel in the world. We pray for people in all areas of life. Our ministry of prayer is as important as other functions in life, more important than most." Never before had I heard such a moving statement about the importance of prayer.

I thought of the regularity with which Jesus went alone to pray and of the eagerness of the disciples to learn how to pray. The gift of prayer is an extension of God's action in creation and redemption; an indication of God's desire for fellowship with that part of creation shaped in the divine image.

When we pray, we make a contribution to God. Persons serious about prayer praise God's name, extol God's wisdom, express delight in God's presence, marvel at God's might, and bow in awe before God's love and grace. Even when requests dominate our prayers, we affirm God by by our effort to commune with God. Offering prayers to God allows us to give to God a part of what God seeks from us. What could be more important than an action that brings pleasure to God?

Prayer is one important way we identify ourselves as human. When we honestly open out lives to God in prayer nor self-sufficient persons, but creatures who will never outgrow a need for our Creator. We are sinners in search of a forgiveness that is beyond our ability to earn or achieve. We are social beings longing for the kind of love and relationship that is available only from a God-sent Savior. We are complex personalities who are starved for acceptance. Praying to God we see our true nature as at no other time.

Only in prayer do we come to the kind of commitment to God that enables us to see life's greatest joys and fulfillment in terms of service, to understand our basic identity as servants of God. What could be more important than coming to see ourselves and our roles in life in the light of God's intentions for us?

Prayer is life in its most concentrated form. When we pray we are in touch with the One who created life and who remains involved in all of life. In prayer, we cannot separate religion and politics, moral principles and business practices, personal values and professional goals, convictions and expediency. Communion with God engages us in a conversation about the whole of life.

Jesus prayed regularly. The earliest disciples of Jesus recognized the importance of prayer and requested, as well as received, help for their praying. How do we see it? More importantly, how do we practice it? Nothing is more important than prayer.

VERSE BY VERSE BY JERRY GROVES

Text: 1st John 4:1....."Dear friends, do not believe every Spirit, but test the spirits to see whether they are from God...because many false prophets have gone out into the world"....

COMMENTS: The Apostle John was a tremendous writer, and very practical about his beliefs about God. He was very aware of the fact that there were many false teachers around in his day who were teaching false ideas about the identity of Jesus, and the reasons why Jesus had come to this world. Some of these teachings said that Jesus was just a man, and not the Son of God, as he claimed.

Serious falsehoods were spread around at that time, and that is why John advised people to be careful about what they were hearing . "Test the Spirits", said John, "to see whether they come from God". In other words, question the teacher, to see if what they were teaching came from God, and was in accord with God's Word. This is very good advice, both in John's day...and today. "There are many false prophets gone out into the world", said John. Considering the number of messages that one hears today about the Lord, through TV and other means, this

is an understatement!...As John says, we should be careful about what we hear.....and not believe every spirit [every teacher], because some of these messages are bogus and phony. Practical question....How does one tell whether a message about Jesus is true or false? One of the ways is to question the teacher about their feelings about Jesus' identity. Was Jesus the Son of God come to the world in human flesh...or was he not? Ask a teacher this question, and see how they answer it. If the teacher says that Jesus was indeed the Son of God in human form...then the likelihood of that teacher teaching right doctrine about Jesus is not necessarily guaranteed, but far more likely than if they believe that Jesus was just a man. [See 1st John 4:2-3] This is the touchstone question that John used to sort out the true and false teachers of his day.

A SUNDAY MESSAGE

(To make it possible for everyone to attend church, we are going to make some special arrangements.)


